Hello and welcome to the Rainbow Guide, our go-to guide for parent carers by parent carers!


Firstly, we know how difficult it may be for you right now, so we wanted to say, we get it, and although we don't know you yet, we hope our paths cross in the future.

#### **About Us**

CWS was established in February 2023 by parent carers, for parent carers. We wanted to ensure that individuals caring for children with additional needs, with or without a diagnosis, had the option of support.

#### What We Do -

- Offer a non judgemental space for those caring for children with additional needs, with or without diagnosis.
- Support parent carers to care for themselves, whatever that looks like.

# Gateshead OFFER

## **Portage**

The Portage Service is part of a 0-5 Service within Education, Schools and Inclusion. It is primarily a home-based teaching service for pre-school children (aged 0-3) with complex special educational needs and disabilities (SEND) and their families living in the Gateshead area. Portage only works into Gateshead homes, pre-school, and educational settings.

The Gateshead Council Portage Service is certified and registered with the National Portage Association and is classified as 5\*, all Portage practice is based on the Portage Model – family focus, child-led play, and targeted interventions, both 1-1 and in groups. The team consists of a Lead Practitioner, two senior Portage workers, four Portage workers and three specialist teaching assistants.

#### What We Do:

- Work with families to help them develop a quality of life and experience, for themselves and their young children.
- Provide home intervention and transition support into nursery settings.
- Offer Portage Groups, some in collaboration with Physio/SLT and OT.
- Deliver Attention Autism: A time limited block of intervention delivered in nursery settings in partnership with SLT.
- Provide Educational Advice as part of the statutory assessment process.
- Offer ongoing advice and guidance around individual children to both PVI and educational settings (this can increase prior to and during the transition process). This may include a weekly session to model appropriate strategies and approaches.
- Providing signposting and assisting with applications where the need arises e.g., DLA, charitable applications for toys and equipment.
- Working jointly with colleagues in Child development Clinic and providing information to inform ASD pathway.
- Facilitate training for parents i.e. Early Communication training/Portage approach, Makaton etc.

#### What We Do Not Do:

- Provide intervention and assessment for children and families with an address outside of Gateshead.
- Provide children with a medical diagnosis.

## Early Years Specialist SEN Teachers, 0-5 Service

The Early Years Specialist Teaching Team provides specialist advice, recommendations and interventions for identified children in Gateshead pre-school settings, including PVIs (private, voluntary and independent), childminders as well as school nurseries. The team supports setting practitioners in

meeting the needs of children who have a significantly greater difficulty in learning than the majority of others of the same age. The Early Years Team liaises with a multi-disciplinary network which may include health, social care, and education professionals to provide holistic assessment of the child's needs.

#### What We Do:

- Offer ongoing assessment and advice around individual children to both PVI, childminders and educational settings.
- Agree individualised learning outcomes with practitioners.
- Offer time limited specialist teaching assistant intervention for modelling and coaching of recommended strategies.
- Deliver Attention Autism alongside setting staff, within a block of targeted intervention when appropriate.
- Provide Educational Advice as part of the statutory assessment process.
- Work jointly with colleagues in Child development Clinic and providing information to inform ASD pathway.
- Facilitate training for parents i.e. Early Bird Programme.
- Deliver training to settings.
- Work collaboratively with the Educational Psychology Service.
- Liaise with parents and health and education professionals at SEN meetings, as arranged by setting staff.
- Offer transition advice through meetings arranged by nursery.
- Offer a point of contact for schools when children are transferring to Reception until October half term, dependent on criteria.

#### What We Do Not Do:

- Offer home visits or home intervention
- Work with children attending a setting outside of Gateshead.
- Provide children with a medical diagnosis.

Referral to the Early Years Specialist Teaching Team can be made by either the nursery practitioner, health visitor or parent using the QR code







#### **Area SENCo Team**



Gateshead has an Area SENCo team of two full-time equivalent Area SENCos, which consists of three teachers and specialists in SEND. The principal focus of their role is to support all early years settings and schools in Gateshead around the early identification and intervention for children with SEND. Schools, childminders, and early years settings in Gateshead can seek advice from the Area SENCo team at the first signs of a concern.

The Area SENCos aim to offer each PVI setting a termly monitoring visit. Schools, childminders, settings, and schools can request visits for advice regarding individual children at any time. There is no referral process – childminders, schools and settings just need to contact their attached Area SENCo by email to request a visit. Advice by telephone is also available at all times.

#### The Area SENCo Team Do:

- Support settings and schools in Gateshead to meet the needs of children with SEND as soon as possible through observational assessment, advice, and guidance.
- Providing day-to-day support to practitioners and early years SENCos in the implementation of the Code of Practice.
- Facilitate strong links between school or setting and education, health, and social services.
- Delivering high-quality training to teachers, practitioners, and childminders to support children with SEND.
- Providing guidance and support for referrals to additional services.

#### The Area SENCo Team Do Not

- Offer a referral system for individual children or provide written reports on individual children.
- Provide advice and support for children who live in Gateshead but attend a setting or school in another local authority.
- Provide advice for individual children's Education, Health, and Care Plans.
- Offer direct teaching support to individual children.
- Complete referrals to other agencies for children.

#### Gateshead's Family Hubs provide a welcoming space for families and the wider community. Our Family Hubs support families from conception to the age of two to give all children the best start in life;

- Maternity services
- · Health and wellbeing clinics
- Infant feeding support
- Activities to support children's development and help prepare them to start School and nursery.

#### We also provide activities for children aged 5-17 years;

- Short breaks
- · Holiday activities and food
- · Neurodivergent youth club
- SEND Lego club

Our facilities include indoor and outdoor play areas and sensory rooms. We also have a Toy Library providing free and low-cost loan of toys, games and sensory equipment. More than forty partners from health, education, social care and community, voluntary and faith organisations are providing activities and services at Gateshead Family Hubs. This includes;

- · Daisy Chain multi agency drop ins and parent support groups
- Child development team
- Portage
- Positive behaviour support sessions

Our Family Voice parent and carer panels meet at all nine Family Hubs to help shape our activities and services. We also offer a virtual Start for Life and Family if you are unable to attend one of our centres.

Registration is free, and you can register on our website, by contacting us direct or by visiting your local Family Hub in person. We will send you a welcome pack with more information about activities and services available.

#### **Early Help Service**



Our Early Help Service is a team of family support workers providing direct, practical help and advice to families with dependent children who may be experiencing difficulties with parenting, family relationships, managing a budget, household routines, child behaviours and school attendance and getting the right help from other professionals.

They provide three main routes to help families get back on track, including:

**Family Hubs** - available in nine communities across the borough, see previous page for details

Family Intervention and Lead Practitioner support - for families requiring extra help. Referrals are typically made by a practitioner already supporting your family - see QR code for details.



They also offer a wide range of free advice and support to help you manage a clam, stable family life.

#### **Healthy Relationships Pathway**



These group programmes are aimed at improving family relationships.

All programmes are delivered at a range of community venues, including our Family Hub sites. Refreshments are provided at all venues, with certificates for programme completion. Support for travel costs is also available if you are on a low income.

#### What does the forum do?

- Discuss issues that affect people with SEND
- Make recommendations to improve SEND services
- Work alongside decision makers to voice their experiences and feedback
- Act as a link between SEND young people and the decision makers









#### Gateshead Special Educational Needs Inclusion Team (SENIT)

The Special Education Needs Inclusion Team (SENIT) is the service which provides SEND outreach across Gateshead to . The service is composed of two specialist teams who provide advice, guidance, support and intervention to enable children and young people to make good progress.

The **High Incidence Needs Team (HINT)** provides support to schools for children and young people with special educational needs and disabilities that are higher in prevalence, or seen more often. These include autism and complex social communication needs, speech and language needs, social emotional and mental health needs and specific learning difficulties. Children and young people do not need to have a diagnosis to receive support from HINT.

Please also note that HINT does not provide diagnoses.

The **Low Incidence Needs Team (LINT)** provides support to schools/settings and families for children and young people aged 0-25 with special educational needs and disabilities that are lower in prevalence, or seen less often. These include hearing impairment, vision impairment, multi-sensory impairment and physical/medical needs.

LINT provide services which may include home teaching for pre-school children and teaching support for school-age children and young people, information and advice on a child or young person's sensory impairment or physical/medical needs and its implications, support with hearing/vision assessments and technologies, assistance with access to specialist equipment, teaching in sign language and Braille if appropriate and supporting access to participation in leisure and social activities outside of school.

## Gateshead Special Educational Needs and Disabilities (SEND) Team

The SEND team works closely with parents, young people, education settings, social care and health services to undertake Education, Health and Care Needs Assessments (EHCNA), issuing

Education, Health and Care Plans (EHCP) and overseeing the annual review of all EHCP's.

The SEND Team consists of caseworkers and annual review officers who act as the main point of advice and contact for young people with EHCP's. This includes panel processes and decisions, consultations with settings and attending/chairing reviews.

Within the SEND Team there are also Quality Assurance Officers who provide advice and guidance on processes and procedures, explore and support to develop actions when there has been a relationship breakdown between the parent/carer and school, monitor attendance and exclusions, monitor timescales and guality assure EHCP's.

#### **Gateshead Education Support Service**

The Education Support Service ensures that children and young people in Gateshead are provided with a suitable education provision. We support all children in Gateshead to access a place in a school in Gateshead that can meet their needs. When a child or young person has difficulties accessing their school we may provide additional support.

#### This can include:

- Advice and support for parents who elect to home educate their child.
- Alternative provision for children who are unable to attend school due to health needs.
- Alternative provision for children who are permanently excluded from school.
- Fair access support for vulnerable children and young people who transfer schools.
- · Support for children who have English as an additional language.

We work with families and schools to enable children and young people to remain in school, as this is the best place for most children and young people to thrive and achieve their full potential. All schools should support children to attend school, but when all options are exhausted, our service can help.

#### **Gateshead Educational Psychology Service**

Gateshead Educational Psychology Service supports schools, settings and families to ensure that all children and young people, including those with special educational needs and disabilities, have the opportunity to fulfil their potential and thrive.

We aim to raise attainment, promote emotional well-being and achieve positive outcomes through the application of psychology to teaching, learning and mental health and wellbeing.

We are part of the Education, Schools, and Inclusion Service within Gateshead Council.

#### What is an Educational Psychologist?

An Educational Psychologist is someone who applies their knowledge of psychology to help understand the strengths and needs of the child or young person. We work closely with schools, nurseries, families, children and young people, and other services within Gateshead.

#### How do Educational Psychologists work?

Every case will be unique, and our involvement may include:

- Consultation with parents/carers, the child or young person, and setting staff
- · Observations of the young person in setting
- Assessments working directly with children and young people to gather their views and complete assessments using a range of resources, toys, games and/or tools
- Verbal recommendations
- Written recommendations
- Discussions around intervention, support and progress
- Signposting to other agencies
- Multi-agency meetings
- · Training for setting staff

#### How does an Educational Psychologist become involved?

If you are concerned about your child's progress or inclusion in school and want to explore involvement from an Educational Psychologist, you must discuss this with the Special Educational Needs Co-ordinator (SENCo) in the school or setting. We cannot accept referrals directly from parents/carers.

#### **Learning and Skills SEND Provision**

We are Learning and Skills, one of the North East's leading providers of post-16 educational services across the region. We have a specialist post-16 SEND provision based at our learning centre in Birtley.

#### What we offer:

- A provision designed to support both young people (16-24) and adults (19+) with learning difficulties and/or disabilities to access education in a safe and inclusive learning environment.
- A curriculum based around the Preparing for Adulthood outcomes with real opportunities for learners to prepare for the next stage of their life, whether that is work, independent living or further learning.
- Lots of support and encouragement for young people to achieve their goals and progress onto their next steps.
- Support from a fabulous team of experienced Tutors and Classroom Support Assistants

#### A choice of three different pathways:

- **1. Steps to Work** a programme designed to prepare young people to take their next steps towards independence be that onto a Supported Internship programme, an apprenticeship, further education or training, paid employment or volunteering.
- **2. Supported Internships** a specialised programme that aims to support young people with SEND to gain the skills and experience needed to progress into paid employment.
- **3. Personal Development** access to a range of personal development courses to explore hobbies and interests and gain new skills and knowledge.

#### What we don't offer:

- Our teaching and support staff are unable to administer medication or carry our personal care tasks.
- Medical or therapeutic interventions such as occupational therapy or speech and language therapy.
- At this time our provision is unable to support young people and adults with Profound and Multiple Learning Disabilities.

#### **Transitions Team**

The Transition Team work with young people and their carers who have received support from children's services and/or are likely to need social care support after the young person reaches 18. To be eligible for a referral a young person will need to have an identified need for care and support under the Care Act (2014) due to either a Physical Disability, Diagnosed Mental Disorder, Learning Disability/and or Autism.

As part of the Transitions Team, a transitions team representative currently attends Year 9 and Year 12 EHCP reviews where they can provide information and advice regarding preventative, universal and specialist services. They attend information events at special schools, signpost to health colleagues and offer information around self-referrals for a transitions assessment to those who may have eligible, adult care and support needs, but who are not currently open to Children's Services.

As part of completing an assessment, the transitions team will adopt a strengths-based approach which will focus on what a young person can do, rather than what they can't do. The team will look to explore ways to support a young person's well-being, resilience, psychological and emotional needs whilst considering how to support and promote independence and positive risk taking.

The young person may have to pay for some of the services they receive as an adult. This will depend on their income and how much help they need. They will be asked to complete a financial assessment. Their transition worker can give them advice and support with this.

#### **Transitions Team**

#### The team focuses on:

- Active involvement of young people and their families in the planning and decision-process concerning their future.
- Raising aspirations for young people through a focus on key areas such as transition, employment, independent living, community participation, relationships, health and wellbeing.
- Providing information and advocacy when required to ensure that young people are able to express their views and are supported to take part in decision-making.

#### The team are unable to offer:

- Packages of support for young people under the age 18.
- Make decisions relating to education placements and/or funding.

For those young people who are already receiving children's services, their social worker will make a referral to the Transitions Team following their 16th birthday. Alternatively, those young people who are not receiving Children's Services can make a self-referral online by visiting our care assessments page.

### Home to School Transport



It is a parent or carer's responsibility to ensure their child gets to and from school safely every day, including those with additional needs.

We provide support with home to school travel in cases where we consider it necessary following an assessment.

#### **Pupils with Additional Needs**

In a small number of cases, pupils may need help because they have additional needs. These may include school pupils with:

- special educational needs (with or without a statement or education, health and care plan)
- a physical disability (temporary or permanent)
- a medical/psychological condition (temporary or permanent)
- other special needs, including family circumstance

#### Disabled Children's Team

The Disabled Children's Team (DCT) provides emotional and practical social care support to meet the needs of children who have substantial, long-term disabilities which have a profound impact on their lives. Our vision is for families with disabled children to have the support they need to live ordinary lives as a matter of course.

The services we can provide to families of children and young people with disabilities assessed as a 'child in need' include:

- short breaks during the day or overnight
- support to enable a disabled child to access community-based leisure activities
- support in the home with the care of a disabled child
- support to access adaptations and special equipment

The team works closely with other services for disabled children to ensure families experience a joined up service.

#### Referral to the team

A referral to the team can be made by anyone, including the families, a GP or a Health Visitor. All initial enquiries and referrals should be made to the Integrated Referral Team on 0191 433 2653 and ask to speak to the duty social worker. All enquires related to open cases should be directed to your allocated social worker.

When a referral to the team is received, a Social Worker will be allocated to undertake the Assessment of Need. Following this Assessment, a decision will be made as to whether the child or young adult is eligible to receive a service from the Team.

#### Disabled Children's Team



To ensure that our services are targeting the appropriate children and young adults, we apply an Eligibility Criteria following an Assessment. The intention of these criteria is to ensure that we do not simply consider the diagnosis that a child or young adult may have; we will also look at the effects their disability has on their day to day life.

- 1. Be aged between 0 and 18 and be ordinarily resident in Gateshead.
- **2.** Have complex needs (in addition to any behavioural problems that may be present), or have a serious or life threatening illness.
- 3. There must be evidence that the child or young adult's additional needs impact significantly on their ability to enjoy ordinary day to day activities.
- **4.** The child or young adult must require a much greater level of day to day care to meet their needs than would usually be required for a person of that age.
- **5.** They must require a significantly higher level of support in at least three of the following areas than would usually be required for their age:
- a) Personal care and supervision
- **b)** Education or employment
- c) Access to social activities
- **d)** Communication
- e) The physical environment
- f) Condition management
- The child or young adult's condition is life limiting, or expected to last 6 months or more.

Your Growing Healthy Team are here for all children and young people, providing support, encouraging healthy lifestyles and protecting those who are most vulnerable.

Gateshead 0-19 Service is a Universal service open to all children and families in Gateshead.

0-5 years -Health Visitors offer 5 mandated contacts to all families. This allows us to assess children throughout their preschool years. We will offer additional intervention from our Early Years Practitioners as necessary. We will refer to partner agencies if further assessment or diagnosis is required

5-19 Years -School Nurses. Referrals are accepted from parents, schools and partner agencies for intervention from our school nurse service. As part of our school nurse team, we have a small team who work specifically with Children and Young People with SEND needs.

We will refer to partner agencies if needed

#### What we can support you with:

- Toileting issues
- Behaviour including sensory worries
- Emotional dysregulation
- Sleep issues

Our SEND Team deliver Health Promotion into the Special Schools offering 1-1 support as well as classroom-based Health Promotion

We also deliver Virtual workshops for sleep and Toileting

Children and Young People's Service (CYPS)

#### **Introduction to CYPS**

We support children and young people across Newcastle and Gateshead. This includes those living in difficult and challenging circumstances.

We work with those aged 0 to 18 years who:

- present with mental health difficulties
  - present with a learning disability

#### Introduction to SPA

We act as the central hub for under 18's mental health services across Newcastle and Gateshead. We are a caring service, committed to giving you the best support. We manage non-emergency referrals for:

- children's and young people's mental health services
  - local voluntary sector organisations

Our team includes people from many different professions. We make sure children, young people and families receive the right support at the right time.

Our focus is:

- finding the right service to refer you to
- pointing you toward other useful services
  - giving advice



#### What will Single Point of Access help me with?

There are many things our service can support you with. But sometimes people come to us when another service would be better. This is not always a bad thing. We may be able to refer you to the service you need. So, it is still better to ask if you are unsure.

To help you, we made a list of the most common reasons people come to us.

We have split it into 2 halves.

- 5 things we can help you with.
- 5 things that other services can help you with.

#### 5 things that we can help you with

- Review your referral to find the best options for you.
- Give advice and guidance for professionals, families, carers and young people.
- Point you toward other services, if specialist mental health support isn't needed.
- Arrange mental health assessments.
- Work with schools, GPs, and other agencies to ensure joined up care.

#### 5 things other services can help you with.

- We do not provide therapy or counselling sessions. But we can refer you to someone who does.
- Crisis intervention or Emergency mental health support.
   Please contact 999 or local crisis teams.
- Adult mental health services. We only support those under age 18.
- Long term support. We only assess you and refer you to the right support.
- Diagnosis of neurodevelopmental conditions except ADHD and autism. But we can help you find a service that does.

#### **Pre-School Autism Assessment Clinic**

The Autism Assessment Team brings together professionals with specialist experience in assessing pre-school children for possible Autism Spectrum Disorder.Children may be seen by a Paediatrician, Speech and Language Therapist, Autism Care Co-ordinator, Health Visitor and Specialist Teacher / Portage.

#### Who do we see?

This service sees children who are above the age of 2 years to before the start of their Reception year at school. They must be registered with a Gateshead GP and be experiencing social-communication difficulties. We do not assess children for ADHD in this clinic.

#### How to be seen

Your child's Health Visitor or education setting can make a referral to the Gateshead 0-4 Referral Meeting, where it will be considered by the Autism Assessment Team.

The outcome of this referral will be communicated to you. If your child is accepted by the Autism Team, further details of the assessment will be provided to you. This may include the following, depending on your child's needs;

- A clinic appointment with you and your child
- · A nursery or school visit
- Other specialist assessments if required.

### Children's Community Nursing Team

The Children's Community Nursing Team provided Nursing care within the community setting from birth to 19 years old (within education). The team consists of 9 qualified Children's Nurses. Student Children's Nurses may also become part of the team during their training and attend the family home and meetings with other members of the CCNT. Our service runs 365 days of the year, weekdays 08:00-20:00, weekends and bank holidays 08:30-17:00.

We receive referrals from hospitals all over the country but also accept referrals from G.P. practices and the wider multi-disciplinary Team. Referrals are accepted for patients who are registered within a Gateshead based G.P. and who live within Gateshead.

The aim of the Children's Community Nursing Team is to provide high standard Nursing care relevant to the child/young person, to prevent hospital admission and to facilitate early discharge from hospital. We provide nursing intervention for acute episodes as well as long term care for patients with life long illness.

We provide a range of nursing care services at a variety of different settings including: Health Centre's, Family Homes, Nursery, School, Playgroups, Respite Care Facilities, Residential care homes, Clinics, Play Schemes and Kids clubs.

We carry out routine planned daily work but also receive unplanned work throughout the day such as feeding devices dislodging, urgent clinical assessments and strategy meetings. Routine planned work can

- Wound Care
- Enteral feeding support and care
- Portacath and CVC/PICC Line Care
- Tracheostomy care
- Oxygen saturation monitoring/weaning
- Intravenous antibiotics administration and infusions

- External services training e.g. Child care providers.

## Children's Bladder and Bowel Service

The service consists of a team of specialist children's nurses who support individuals with bladder and bowel problems, where primary advice and intervention by GP, health visitor, school nurse or other health professional has not been successful. We offer a confidential, friendly service, undertake a comprehensive assessment, which may include investigations such as stool samples, urinalysis, ultrasound scans, physical and abdominal examinations. We provide a programme specific to the child or young person's condition in order to promote continence. This may include self-help advice, medication, equipment or toileting aids.

#### Who do we see?

We see children and young people aged 1-19 years, who are registered with a Gateshead GP who commonly have concerns such as:

- Constipation
- Soiling
- Stool withholding
- Day time wetting (over 5 years old)
- Nocturnal enuresis (bedwetting)
- Overactive bladder (urine urgency/ frequency)
- Those needing specialist support to achieve their toilet training developmental skill

Referral into the service is only via a health professional such as your GP or Health Visitor.

Each referral is triaged to ensure the child and young person's condition meets Children's Bladder and Bowel Service criteria. If the service criteria is not met, you will be informed by letter and given information detailing alternate services and support.

## Gateshead Health Children's Occupational Therapy

Children's occupational therapists work in partnership with children and young people, their families, carers and supporting professionals. The main focus of occupational therapy is to empower and support children and young people to live their lives as independently as possible within the context of their family unit and community.

Gateshead Children's Occupational Therapy Service helps children and young people aged 0-18 years who are registered with a Gateshead GP participate and manage in their everyday tasks and activities to support development, health and wellbeing by providing specialist interventions.

#### **How To Be Seen By This Service**

Your health visitor, school nurse or portage team may be able to give you some preliminary advice around your child's needs. If your child requires further support, referrals into the specialist Children's Occupational Therapy Service are accepted from GPs, Social Workers, Health, and Education professionals.

Referrals to the team are triaged and appointments arranged with parents and carers to discuss areas of strength and difficulty.

#### **What To Expect At Your Appointment**

The occupational therapist will discuss strategies, programmes, and equipment specific to the child or young person and their supporting adults. Intervention may include a variety of settings such as home, respite, nursery, and school.

Assessment may include one or more of the following depending on need and the type of challenges identified:

- a home visit
- a nursery or school visit
- a clinic appointment
- a group session (with children with similar needs)

## Children's Physiotherapy Service

Children's (or paediatric) physiotherapists provide treatment and care to babies, children, and young people from birth to 19 years. They have specialist skills, expert knowledge and experience of childhood development and disabilities.

A children's physiotherapist will assess a child's range of movement, strength and current level of function, to identify areas of difficulty or weakness.

#### Who do we see?

This service sees children and young people aged 1-19 years, who are registered with a Gateshead GP who commonly have concerns such as:

- Children with 'Developmental Delay'
- Children with neuromuscular disorders such as Cerebral Palsy, Spina Bifida, Muscular Dystrophy
- Children under 5 years of age with muscular skeletal conditions including intoeing gait, 'knock knees', and tip toe walking.

#### **How To Be Seen By This Service**

Your health visitor, school nurse, other health professional or portage team may be able to give you some preliminary advice around your child's needs. If your child requires further support, referrals into the specialist Children's Physiotherapy Service are accepted from health professionals such as a GP, Health Visitor or Paediatric Consultant.

Once your referral has been triaged you will receive an assessment appointment.

Assessment may include one or more of the following depending on need identified:

- a home visit
- a nursery or school visit

#### Children's Speech and Language Therapy

The Speech and Language Therapy (SLT) Service aims to maximise the communication potential of children and young people aged 0-19 years with speech, language and communication needs.

The team also provides assessment and support to families to ensure their child can maintain safe and effective eating, drinking and swallowing to ensure healthy growth and wellbeing.

#### Who Do We See?

The service sees children and young people aged 0-19 years who are registered with a Gateshead GP, who commonly have concerns such:

- Paediatric eating and drinking difficulties
- Difficulties with functional communication (can children and young people make their wants / needs known?)
- Language delays and disorders

- Hearing Impairment (where it has impacted on the child's speech, language and communication skills)

#### **Wheelchair Services**

The Gateshead Wheelchair Service provides manual and powered wheelchairs, buggies and specialist seating services to children and adults with mobility problems.

The overall aim of the service is to increase an individual's mobility, independence and quality of life. At the wheelchair assessment an individual's lifestyle needs are taken into consideration along with their medical conditions and the most appropriate equipment for their needs is provided.

If an individual wishes to choose an alternative wheelchair, we offer a voucher scheme, to enable them to purchase a wheelchair of their choice.

Wheelchairs provided by the service are maintained and repaired by Ross Care.

#### Who is the service for?

The service is for children and adults who are registered with a Gateshead GP who have a permanent disability affecting their mobility.

The Wheelchair service is not suitable for people who require outdoor-only powered mobility, or those who are living in a nursing home / residential home and require a wheelchair for transit use only.

#### Referrals

We accept referrals from GPs and other health or social care professionals. Patients already known to the service are able to re-refer themselves via phone, post or email.

Following a referral, we will notify you of your appointment by letter or telephone. If the date and/or time is not convenient, please contact us and we will rearrange it for a more suitable time.

Patients' relatives, carers or therapists are very welcome to attend the clinic as this is often useful when patients find it difficult to communicate.

The SENDIASS Service provides independent impartial advice to parents/carers with a child aged 0-25 years old with special educational needs (SEN). We provide advice to young people aged 16-25 years old about their SEN too. We also offer support with health and social care.



Gateshead's SENDIASS service is provided by Barnardo's Disability and Inclusion Support Service on behalf of Gateshead Council and Health (the ICB).

#### What we do:

**Information** - You may find the answer to some of your questions through the information on our web pages. If you can't find the answers to your questions, you can get in touch by email or phone, or text, you choose what works for you.

**Advice** - We provide impartial advice and information to enable you to make your own choices.

We can discuss with you how to raise your concerns and help you to find positive ways to communicate with school and the local authority.

**Rights**—We provide information and can help you to understand what the law says and what your rights are, enabling you to make informed choices.



SPACE Pilot is a social prescribing partnership between Ways to Wellness and the Great North Children's Hospital.

Our specialist Link Workers offer non-medical support to complement the work of your child's medical team. We support the whole family, including parents and siblings. We focus on "what matters to you", by using action planning and goal setting guided by you and your child.





Our membership includes representatives from many of the 7,000 conditions that are genetic and rare, and new conditions are regularly identified through scientific progress.

Genetic Alliance UK's purpose is to work together to improve the lives of the 3.5 million people in the UK living with lifelong and complex genetic, rare and undiagnosed conditions.

#### Things we do:

- Genetic Alliance UK produces accessible resources called Rare Resources for those affected by genetic, rare and undiagnosed conditions and the people they interact with to help explain the impact of the condition, what to expect when it comes to care and where they can find support.
  - 2. We signpost individuals affected by genetic, rare and undiagnosed conditions to appropriate support organisations and networks.
- 3. We provide information on various topics for people with genetic, rare and undiagnosed conditions including genetic testing and services, insurance, screening, genes and genomics.
  - 4. Genetic Alliance UK leads SWAN UK (Syndromes Without A Name), the only UK support community for families with children who have a genetic condition so rare that it does not yet have a name.
- 5. We campaign on a national level for timely diagnosis, better coordinated care, and improved screening, testing, services and treatment. Genetic Alliance UK amplifies the voices of the genetic, rare and undiagnosed community with the NHS, policymakers, researchers, parliamentarians and the government.

#### Things we don't do:

1. We do not provide genetic testing services. Genetic Alliance UK gives information

how to access genetic testing and guidance on securing the right genetic testing for individuals. However, we do not have laboratory or clinical facilities and do not provide genetic testing services.

2. We do not provide medical advice on diagnosis, care and treatment. Our team does

not receive medical training and are not in the position to provide opinion or judgement on diagnosis, care plans or treatment. We signpost questions about care to appropriate organisations or explain how to approach this issue in the NHS.

3. We do not provide individual advocacy. Genetic Alliance UK do not act as advocates

for individuals. We cannot attend appointments or speak to health professionals on behalf of individuals. We do, however, work to address systemic challenges via our national campaigning.



Exchange your qualifying mobility allowance, awarded with DLA (Disability Living Allowance) for a brand-new car or Wheelchair Accessible Vehicle (WAV) depending on your families needs.





# Which type of vehicle suits my family best?

Different vehicles suit different people, so we'll help you decide between our vehicle types and any adaptations. We'll help you make sure you're making the right choice for your needs.

## How do I apply and order?

You can start applying online if it's a car or a WAV. Once you've found a vehicle you like, and had a test drive, visit a Motability Scheme dealer and they'll order it for you. Most dealerships will have a specific person on site to help you with this.



## How do I pay?



We'll receive your payments straight from your allowance provider, to make paying simple.



### What is an Advanced payment?

It's the amount you need to pay upfront for some of the larger or more expensive vehicles. It's a one off payment made by **you** before or on the day of collection.

It is not a deposit and it's non-refundable.

There are also some vehicles which have no Advance Payment, or cost less than your weekly allowance, which means you'll still get the rest of your allowance to spend however you choose.

# Carer Card At CNTW Hospitals

#### Who is a carer

A carer is someone who looks after another person, usually a family member or friend, who could not manage without their support due to illness, disability, mental health problems or an addiction.

#### What is the Carer Card

We value carers and the essential role they play. The Carer Card identifies carers, and recognises the value of their involvement in the care of people who have accessed services within the Trust.

#### **Using the Carer Card**

#### Identification

The Carer Card will enable everyone to recognise someone as a carer.

#### Trust cafés

The Carer Card offers a carer 50% discount in Trust cafés, when shown at the till. The maximum discount is £10 on a £20 daily spend, at the following cafés:

#### **Parking at Trust sites**

The Carer Card can be used to register a car for free parking at all Trust owned sites.

Vehicle details must be registered through a main reception desk. This registration will allow free parking for one year.

\* It is the carers responsibility to ensure they are parked on a Trust site and to re-register their vehicle after one year.

#### How does a carer get a Carer Card

A carer should be offered a Carer Card by staff in clinical services.

# What are Changing Places?

They are larger toileting facilities that have equipment, including a changing bench and a hoist, to support people with disabilities who need assistance.

#### A 'Changing Places' must include:

- height-adjustable, adult-sized changing bench
- ceiling track hoist system
- adequate space for the disabled person and up to two assistants
- peninsular toilet with space both sides for assistants
- privacy screen
- wide paper roll
- large waste disposal bin
- washbasin, preferably height adjustable
- Back rest on toilet seat
- A shower is also recommended but not in every one

### What is a RADAR key?

A RADAR key is a key that allows people with disabilities to access locked public toilets in the UK. RADAR stands for Royal Association for Disability and Rehabilitation.



#### How it works

The RADAR key is part of the National Key Scheme (NKS).

The key is large and silver-coloured.

The key is used to open over 10,000 disabled toilets in the UK.

The key can be found in many shopping centres, pubs, cafes, cinemas, bus and rail stations.

RADAR keys cannot always be used to access locked public toilets. Some now require codes, which you are usually able to get by calling a number located near the keypad or by asking a member of staff.

# Carers Concessions, Reduced Rates & More

### What are carer concessions and how do you get them?

Some local carer services have discount cards for carers registered with them that so they can get money off at local businesses. Multiple locations across the country offer different reduced rates, concessions, and passes to families who have individuals with additional needs.

We advise before your trip, check the locations website, and read their concession rates usually within the ticket info area. Some sites also offer access to sensory rooms, quiet spaces, and options to queue jump, so it is always worth contacting them before your visit. Your local council may offer discounts for leisure activities, such as swimming.

#### How do I prove disability or that I am a carer?

Most sites and bookings that offer concessional tickets or bookings usually ask for proof of need upon admission. Usually, this would be a form of physical evidence that you can show to the check in/host.

We would advise you to have on hand a DLA award letter, Blue badge, Medical letter (hospital letterheaded) or an disability registered card available in some areas.

Keep these items in a safe space, in their own plastic wallet, as sometimes places offer discounted rates without advertisement. This will allow you to have them on hand for spontaneous visits/days out.

\*When using blue badge as evidence, once checked, they do allow you to return it to your vehicle for parking.



#### What else can i do for discounted rates?

There are multiple sites that offer reduced rates on experiences such as Groupon or Wowcher. There is also multiple discounts available on websites such as www.discountsforcarers.co.uk.

You can also receive discounts on occasion when using your Max card, a discount card available to families who have children on the SEND register, cared and looked after children.





The CEA Card is a national card scheme developed for UK cinemas. The card enables a disabled cinema guest to receive a complimentary ticket for someone to go with them when they visit a participating cinema. If you require an adjustment to visit a cinema because of your disability, cinema staff should make them for you whether you have a CEA Card or not.

There is also reduced rates through Kids Pass website. For just £1 you can access the discounts for a full 30 days, with apparently over 1000+ discounts across theme parks, zoos, cinemas, and more.


